Pastor's Annual Report – “Still Wading In”

2025 - Inspired by Matthew 3:13–17 and the lived ministry of Starview UCC

This past year at Starview United Church of Christ was not marked by spectacle or sudden change, but by something far more enduring: faithful presence. Again and again, I found myself returning to the image of Jesus stepping into the waters of the Jordan - not to perform, not to impress, but to *wade in*. Before preaching, before healing, before public ministry fully unfolded, Jesus entered the water simply to be present, to claim identity, and to stand in solidarity with the people. That image became a quiet guide for my ministry among you this year.

Much of our work together in 2025 looked like that - wading in. Showing up. Staying rooted. Trusting that God is already at work in the ordinary rhythms of congregational life. There were sermons preached and sacraments shared, of course, but also countless conversations, prayers offered in hallways and hospital rooms, meals shared at tables, emails answered, plans adjusted, and moments held gently when words were hard to find. This is the unseen but sacred work of pastoral ministry, and I am grateful to share it with a congregation that understands faithfulness as something lived, not rushed.

Together, we continued to nurture a congregation that values thoughtful worship, meaningful relationships, and responsive ministry. Weekly worship remained the heartbeat of our shared life, supported by dedicated lay leadership, musicians, teachers, and volunteers who give generously of their time and gifts. Our music ministry continued to enrich worship, our Sunday School and children's ministry evolved with care, and Messy Church emerged as a joyful, community-wide expression of faith that welcomed families exactly as they are.

Beyond Sunday mornings, Starview's ministry continued to take shape in new and meaningful ways. *Pub, Grub, and God* grew into a consistent, family-friendly gathering where faith and culture met around shared tables. Dinner Church continued to offer creative, embodied worship experiences. The launch of *Shadows to Sunshine*, our mental health support ministry, created sacred space for honesty, grounding, and hope - a quiet but courageous step in responding to real needs within our community. These ministries reflect a congregation willing to meet people where they are, trusting that God does some of the deepest work in spaces that feel safe, human, and real.

Pastoral care remained a significant and holy part of my ministry this year. I walked with individuals and families through seasons of grief, illness, transition, and uncertainty, as well as moments of joy, celebration, and renewal. Some of that care was visible; much of it was not. All of it mattered. In each visit, call, or quiet prayer, I was reminded that the church is not simply an institution - it is a living body, tender and resilient, held together by love and trust.

This year also marked a personal milestone for me: twenty years of ordained ministry, all of them spent here at Starview UCC. That continuity is a gift I do not take lightly. It has allowed us to grow together, to weather change with honesty, and to deepen our shared understanding of what it means to be church in this time and place. I remain deeply grateful for your trust, your patience, your humor, and your willingness to keep listening for where God is leading us next.

As we look toward 2026, I do so with hope and humility. There is more work ahead: opportunities to deepen discipleship, strengthen outreach, and continue cultivating spaces of belonging and healing. We will welcome new leadership, continue forming faith across generations, and keep discerning how God is calling Starview to show up in the world. We may not always know the full shape of what lies ahead, but we do know this: God meets us when we wade in.

Thanks be to God for the work behind us, the work before us, and the Living Water that sustains us in every season.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN REPORT

2025 was a very successful year for our Capital Campaign. The Capital Campaign was kicked off in January 2024 to raise \$50,000 over a three-year period from January 2024 through December 2027. I am pleased to inform you that total funds raised by our Congregation are \$69,583.36. God bless all of you. In addition, we received \$67,857.28 in insurance proceeds due to storm damage to the church and parsonage roofs and siding in 2024. We replaced the church roof for \$50,600 and replaced the parsonage roof and siding for \$28,120. The dusk to dawn lights were replaced at a cost of \$388.50. The outside church masonry project was completed for \$17,450 and the parsonage chimney repair cost \$1,100. Automatic light sensors have been installed in all four bathrooms.

Currently, the Capital Campaign Fund balance is \$41,270.64 and the Building Fund balance is \$12,392.92.

We are pleased that several members of our church continue to regularly contribute to the Capital Campaign.

CHURCH COUNCIL PRESIDENT REPORT

APPROVALS: These are highlights of items that were approved. Copies of the 2025 church council minutes are available upon request.

A council and congregation member attended Faith UCC for Equilla to be ordained. Delegates attended the Penn Central Conference. Two delegates also participated in the Keystone Conference Budget Meeting.

We received a letter from our insurance company, Church Mutual, stating our policy would not be renewed. After meeting with three different insurance companies, Brotherhood was approved as our new insurance company.

New roofs were installed on the church and parsonage.

New siding was installed on the parsonage.

Masonry work was completed on the church. Masonry work was also done on the parsonage chimney.

Floors were scrubbed and polished in the fellowship hall, hallways and landings upstairs and downstairs.

Ellis Pest Control checked for evidence of bats in parsonage attic. Droppings were found but believed to be from the removal of the siding. Ellis checked the attic again in September to be sure and no evidence was found. Per Ellis, the issue is taken care of and annual inspections should no longer be necessary.

Boulders were approved to be placed around the sign out front of church to protect it from being hit again. This project has not been completed yet but is currently being researched.

Several maintenance issues were taken care of at the parsonage: torn screening was replaced on screen doors, issue with bees underneath siding was addressed several times by the exterminator, air conditioner was replaced and problem with blown outlet was taken care of.

Fundraiser dates for R&K and Naylor's were approved.

Organ repairs were donated by Marta's nephew, Josh. A wedding gift of \$1,000 was approved for his wedding gift.

A \$100 gift card was given to our tenants in celebration of their baby's birth.

Trash and recycling service frequency was increased. The price and contract end date stayed the same.

Extensive research was completed by DOCEO for new computers, software, WiFi adapters, etc. A quote has been received but a decision to move forward still needs to be discussed. Andrew Boyer and Kat Fuhrman volunteered to review the quote.

In honor of Pastor Laura's 20th anniversary and Mecca award, a luncheon catered by Mission Bar-B-Que was approved.

Life Path gift cards were received and council approved donating them to them people in need that contact Pastor Laura during the holiday season. Any gift cards not used will be donated to help veterans.

2026 budget was approved.

2026 council officers were selected: Cathy Rentzel, President, Peg Gingerich, Vice President, council meetings will be recorded and then transcribed by Leslie.

Dinner Church is one example. In March, we celebrated Mardi Gras with masks, beads, and a King Cake. WE learned that three colors are traditionally associated with Mardi Gras: purple symbolizes JUSTICE, green symbolizes FAITH, and gold symbolizes POWER. A special service was held to introduce the congregation to MESSY CHURCH; and "Hanging of the Greens" involved everyone in attendance. CALLED TO CARE MINISTRY

Faithful Care in the Present • Hopeful Vision for 2026

Throughout 2025, Starview UCC's **Called to Care** ministry continued its steady and compassionate work of sharing Christ's love through presence, practical support, and human connection. Structured through three core care teams - visitation, cards, and meals - this ministry carried companionship into homes, hospitals, and seasons shaped by loss, illness, recovery, and life transitions. Our visitation ministers, Peg Gingerich, JoAnn Kreeger, and Donna Hoover, extended a ministry of presence marked by intentional listening and heartfelt care. The card ministry, served by ministers including Sue Brenner, Tammy Duke, Mareta Elvey, Brenda Plowman, and JoAnn Kreeger, offered encouragement and remembrance through handwritten notes that delivered comfort and connection long after the envelopes were opened. The meal ministry, shared by ministers including Marta Dennis, JoAnn Kreeger, and Sue Brenner, provided nourishment and support through the coordination and delivery of home-cooked meals, reminding those facing heavy days that care includes both soul and sustenance. Yet beyond the structure of teams and roles, the heart of Called to Care was carried by the whole congregation, where compassion was not assigned, but shared freely through prayers, visits, meals, and quiet kindness offered wherever needs arose.

Another meaningful expression of care took shape in 2025 through **Shadows to Sunshine**, a safe, trauma-informed, Christ-centered emotional support ministry that grew from the courageous vision of church member and co-leader Jessica Casseday. Following a Called to Care Community Seminar on Suicide Awareness, organized by church members Andrew Boyer and Heather Taylor, and a newly published book by member, Rev. Dr. Martha Boyer, titled, *My Quest for Shalom: Finding Peace in Mental Health*, Jessica discerned a need for a congregation-based space rooted in both safety and spiritual grounding. Pastor Laura enthusiastically partnered to support, organize, and steward the development of this ministry, helping Jessica's original vision take sustainable form in the life of the church. The group established a predictable 1-hour rhythm, gathering every other Monday from 6:00 to 7:00 PM in the church Parlor, with anchor dates such as January 5, January 12, January 26, February 9, February 23, and continuing every other Monday through the year. The ministry created a supportive space where participants could step in when able, grow in self-awareness without overwhelm, and experience healing that honors agency, choice, and compassionate community.

While we did not host a **GriefShare** group in 2025, we look ahead with gratitude to its return in 2026. Our next 13-week bereavement-focused cycle will launch on February 16, 2026, meeting Mondays at 3:00 PM in the Parlor, with 2-hour sessions offered at no cost thanks to congregational generosity. Each participant will receive a personal workbook to keep, filled with tools and guided reflections for the grief journey. Participants may join at any point along the 13-week cycle, make up missed sessions in future courses, and attend up to three total cycles over time according to personal need. This flexibility reflects our pastoral conviction that grief does not unfold in orderly stages, nor should healing be rushed, but rather gently accompanied in safe and compassionate company.

In 2025, the Called to Care and Worship Team also hosted the **Annual Blue Christmas Service** on December 21, a sacred worship moment honoring those carrying grief during the holiday season. This year's service was thoughtfully compiled and led by church member and Lancaster Theological Seminary/Moravian University seminary student, Andrew Boyer, whose theological reflection and pastoral sensitivity shaped a liturgy that honored grief honestly and God's presence gently. We give thanks for his leadership, care, and faithful witness in crafting a meaningful service for the congregation.

As we move into 2026, we carry forward our existing ministries and expand into new spaces of healing and support, grounded in the enduring truth that Called to Care exists so that no one grieves, heals, or journeys alone. For those feeling stirred toward any of these caregiving ministries, we will continue offering training in visitation and compassionate care in the year ahead, equipping the church to extend Christ's love even further into our community. JAM (Jesus and Me) & MESSY CHURCH

Faith Formed Around Tables • Worship Made by Many Hands • Discerning the Seasons Ahead

Throughout 2025, Starview UCC's Jesus and Me (JAM) ministry continued to grow and adapt to meet the needs of children, youth, and families, evolving into the intergenerational discipleship and worship experience now known as Messy Church, which will continue through the spring of 2026 as we prayerfully discern whether the fall and winter seasons will remain Messy Church or return to JAM in its original format. The heart of JAM remained steady -nurturing relationships across generations, grounding our learning in Scripture, sharing meals in community, and encountering God through creative and participatory worship. In the winter/spring session, JAM gathered adults and young disciples around tables and on chancel steps, where Scripture was explored not through lecture, but through relationship, engaging bible study and storytelling, song, chimes, boom whackers, bucket drumming, drama, and hands-on crafts that helped faith take embodied shape. Our youngest learners were taught with joy and care by Carol Wagner and Andrew Boyer, while Pastor Baker taught middle and high school youth, helping steward theological reflection for older students. Worship arts for JAM - was organized and co-led by Pastor Laura, Carol Wagner, and Peg Gingerich. Dinner Deans Claire Moore and Peg Gingerich created themed meals and imaginative table games, including a memorable indoor snowball battle that brought laughter and connection to the heart of our gatherings. Table Parents for the year, including Donna Hoover, Deb Runkle, Heather Taylor, Andrew Boyer, and Claire Moore, offered steady, relational support for families and students alike. The kitchen crew also ensured the ministry of hospitality continued beyond the meal, washing dishes and cleaning up while classes and worship arts took place, supporting the full rhythm of the evening without interrupting learning or worship. JAM's ministry was sustained not only through volunteer leadership and generous financial donations but also through the faithful financial support of the Starview UCC congregation.

On September 7, 2025, Church Council approved a Messy Church Sunday Worship Experience in place of traditional Sunday morning worship, themed *The Potter's House* and grounded in Jeremiah 18:1–6, inviting the entire congregation into a hands-on encounter with Scripture through clay-shaping (led by Deb Runkle), mosaic pots (led by Anna Mae Schriver), prayer, and creativity. The October gathering continued this creative worship journey through the theme Jesus as the Light of the World from John 8:12, where families created lighthouses (led by Peg Gingerich) and stained-glass crafts (led by Deb Runkle), celebrating Christ's life-giving light. In November, Messy Church was woven into a Hanging of the Greens Dinner Church service on November 23, 2025, at 6 PM, where the congregation learned about Advent meanings and decorated the sanctuary in seasonal beauty, inspiring a request for this Dinner Church-style experience to continue annually, with the next date set for November 22, 2026, at 6 PM.

JAM (Jesus and Me) & MESSY CHURCH (CONT.)

In December 2025, Messy Church gathered for a special Nativity-focused afternoon in the Fellowship Hall, where 28 folks experienced the Christmas story through hands-on gospel storytelling, painting stand-up wooden nativity sets, assembling nativity wreaths, creating homemade Christmas cards, and preparing the beloved no-bake chocolate peanut butter “Donkey Dung” cookies - an activity that brought delight into Fellowship Hall and helped children learn the Gospel story with laughter and joy. We look ahead with gratitude and hope for the ways JAM/Messy Church continues to form disciples through community, worship, creativity, and shared care, and we trust the Spirit to continue guiding our discernment for future seasonal expressions of this ministry.

Another important aspect of making disciples for Christ, for growing in faith, is giving our young people opportunities to serve others. Therefore, every session involves a mission project. In the past, we've served others near us. For example, by making and delivering blankets or putting together, putting together arts & craft activity bags for Caitlin's Smiles, which serves pediatric patients and their siblings. We also visited several long-term care facilities to sing and play bells for the residents. In 2025, the mission had a worldwide vision. 120 Hygiene Kits were compiled and donated to CWS (Church World Services). The mission was made possible not only through the labor of our young people, but also by monetary donations from JAM, generous members of the congregation and a grant from the National United Church of Christ.

Thank you to Claire Moore and Peg Gingerich, our Spring Dinner Deans, whose imaginative themed meals and community-building games - especially the indoor snowball battle - strengthened relationships across generations. We also extend gratitude to Brian Clemens, church janitor, whose faithful work prepared clean, welcoming ministry space for JAM each week and countless other gatherings downstairs. Most of all, thanks to YOU, the congregation whose prayers, participation, encouragement, and loving presence carried this ministry forward. Because of you, JAM became a living sanctuary of compassion, connection, creativity, and worship that reflected Christ's love not only in what we did, but in how faithfully we did it - together.

SERVANTS NORTHEAST HOME HELPS WORK CAMP

Faith in Motion • Love Made Visible • Hope for the Road Ahead

The Northeastern Home Helps Work Camp through Servants, Inc. (Red Lion) marked its 16th year of ministry partnership with Starview UCC, taking place during the final full week of July 2025. This year, 79 volunteers, ages 8 to 83, gathered from more than 20 churches and Christian traditions, forming intergenerational work crews who served our neighbors through hands-on home restoration projects. Over four full days of service, volunteers donated a combined 14,069 hours of labor, completing projects that included staining decks, repairing drywall, painting interiors, raking and restoring yards, cleaning and organizing living spaces, and offering companionship through meaningful conversation and prayer with homeowners. Had the labor alone been completed by contractors, the typical cost of labor would have exceeded **\$58,000**, yet this ministry was carried out by neighbors helping neighbors—ordinary people moved by faith and compassion. Each morning began with devotions and prayer, grounding our hearts in God’s call before stepping into the day’s work. Meal preparation and serving of breakfast, lunch, and dinner was organized by church member JoAnn Kreeger, whose servant-hearted leadership, hospitality coordination, and partnership with Servants staff ensured volunteers and homeowners alike were cared for with dignity, nourishment, welcome, and connection.

This ministry was sustained not only through donated materials and volunteer labor, but also through the faithful financial support of the Starview UCC congregation, which annually designates budgeted funds to ensure the continuation of this outreach. The annual R & K Sub and Sandwich Sale also took place in 2025, offering an additional pathway for participation, connection, and generosity. Members purchased and donated subs and sandwiches to serve as lunch for both volunteers and homeowners, allowing Work Camp funds to be redirected toward supplies, tools, and the Closing Celebration Banquet. This model created meaningful space for participation by members who could not be physically present during the Work Camp week due to work obligations, parenting responsibilities, caregiving roles, health concerns, or other limitations, ensuring that the congregation could contribute to the ministry even when schedules or circumstances made on-site service difficult. In this ministry, a simple sub or sandwich became more than a meal - it became an expression of care, a way to serve our neighbors, and a reminder that every contribution matters in the shared work of compassion.

Looking ahead to 2026, we are energized and grateful to continue this ministry once more, as the next Northeast Home Helps Work Camp will take place July 20 - 24, 2026, hosted again at Starview UCC, with a congregational Celebration Service on Sunday, July 26, 2026, where we will again give thanks for God’s ongoing work through service, community, presence, and shared compassion. We do not mark this ministry as a task completed, but as a witness carried forward, believing that the Jesus Way remains the path toward wholeness, repair, and hope for the world God loves.
